Oh, sure, he got a big kick out of ripping the paper off presents, but that was about it.

Now that Finn is almost three, I'm on the fence about whether I should spring the magic of Santa on my son. My wife Ellen and I have pointed out images of Santa in store window displays, and in books. If we ask, "Who's that?" Finn will sometimes say "Santa Claus." I think the idea of Christmas is starting to gel in his mind. For example, just the other day, we passed some Christmas decorations in a store window. Finn leaned in to whisper, "Santa bring trains to Finn."

If I open our front door wearing Santa gear, how will Finn react? (We don't have a fireplace, so the part about Santa sliding down the chimney is not an option.) Will my son freak out? Or will my alert little boy see through my disguise instantly, and in Scrooge-like voice say, "No Daddy wearing Santa suit now!"

Given our recent success with introducing Finn to Halloween traditions, we're excited about doing the same for Christmas and Hanukkah. We want to encourage him to learn some Christmas carols. And, with our supervision, he'll help us light the candles on our Hanukkah menorah. While it may be too early for him to sing the prayers, I know he'll love counting the colorful candles each night.
